<b>JOBS &amp; WAGES</b>	<ul style="list-style-type: none"> <li>• Opposed a trade agreement that will send jobs overseas and worsen conditions for workers [CAFTA, Vote #443, 7/28/05]</li> <li>• Supported a vote to increase the minimum wage to \$7.25 an hour [Vote #365, 7/12/05]</li> <li>• Supported spending \$286 billion to modernize our nation's transportation infrastructure, creating more than 1 million jobs protected by Davis Bacon community wage standards [Vote #453, 7/29/05]</li> <li>• Supported the reinstatement of Davis Bacon community wage standards for workers on federal construction projects in states affected by Hurricane Katrina, which President Bush suspended [HR 3763]</li> <li>• Opposed giving Wal-Mart a sweetheart deal—after it violated child labor laws—that would weaken wage and hour protections [Vote #318, 6/24/05]</li> <li>• Supported a bill that provides protections for workers to form unions [Employee Free Choice Act, HR 1696]</li> </ul>

<b>HEALTH CARE</b>	<ul style="list-style-type: none"> <li>• Opposed slashing funds for Medicaid, which provides low-income families, children and seniors with health care [Vote #601, 11/18/05]</li> <li>• Opposed a health care plan that would strip away critical consumer protections and raise premiums for the majority of small business employees [Vote #426, 7/26/05]</li> </ul>	
<b>TAX FAIRNESS</b>	<ul style="list-style-type: none"> <li>• Opposed a budget that uses the Social Security trust fund surplus to pay for tax cuts for the wealthiest Americans [Vote #149, 4/28/05]</li> <li>• Voted against \$56 billion in tax cuts mostly for wealthy investors. The House earlier voted to cut \$50 billion from Medicaid, food stamps and student loans [Vote #621, 12/8/05]</li> </ul>
