

# NEVADA

## *Voters' Bill of Rights*

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You have the right to vote—it's the law, and you have the proof in your hands! You'll notice letters and numbers after each of your rights listed below. Those codes tell lawyers and poll workers where to find the actual Nevada statute that protects your right to vote. These rights are guaranteed to properly registered and qualified voters. You have the right to bring this bill of rights with you into the polling area. ### **Nevada Voters' Bill of Rights:**

1. On Election Day, each polling place opens at 7 a.m. and closes at 7 p.m. If you are in line or in the process of voting when the polls close at 7 p.m., **YOU HAVE THE RIGHT TO VOTE.** (Nev. Rev. Stat. Ann. §§ 293.273, 293.305)
2. **YOU HAVE THE RIGHT TO VOTE** a regular ballot by signing the election register if your signature matches the signature on file with the election board or if you provide identification that contains a photo or description. (§ 293.277)
3. **YOU HAVE THE RIGHT TO VOTE** by provisional ballot—for federal candidates only—if you are registered to vote but your name does not appear on a voter registration list or if your eligibility is in question on Election Day. (§§ 293.3081, 293.3032)
4. If you are a first-time voter who registered by mail and you do not have identification, **YOU HAVE THE RIGHT TO VOTE** by provisional ballot for federal candidates only. (§§ 293.3081, 293.3082)
5. If you cannot read or you are blind or otherwise physically disabled, **YOU HAVE THE RIGHT** to be assisted with voting by any person except your employer or an agent of your employer or an officer or agent of your union. (§ 293.296)
6. If you are elderly or disabled, **YOU HAVE THE RIGHT** to a polling place and a voting booth that is accessible to you. (§ 293.2955)
7. If the register incorrectly indicates that you have moved, **YOU HAVE THE RIGHT TO VOTE** in the correct precinct where you live, provided that you give an oral or written affirmation before an election board officer that you continue to live at the same address. (§§ 293.525, 293.304)
8. If you have moved from one precinct or district to within the same county since the last general election, **YOU HAVE THE RIGHT TO VOTE** in the election precinct or district of your previous residence, provided that you give an oral or written affirmation before an election board officer attesting to your new address. (§§ 293.525(l)(a), 293.304)
9. If you have moved within the same precinct or district since the last general election, **YOU HAVE THE RIGHT TO VOTE** in your new polling place, provided that you give an oral or written affirmation before an election board officer attesting to your new address. (293.525(l)(b))
10. When you are within 100 feet of the building in which the polling place is located, **YOU HAVE THE RIGHT** to wait to vote (or to vote) without anyone electioneering, soliciting a vote or speaking with you about marking your ballot. (§293.740)
11. **YOU HAVE THE RIGHT** to receive ballots, instructions and other voting materials in Spanish in Clark County, to receive non-English materials for Shoshone voters in Elko, Nye and White Pine counties, to receive non-English materials for Paiute voters in Lyon County and non-English materials for other Native American voters in Elko and Humboldt counties. (§ 293.2699. 42 U.S.C. § 1973 et seq.; 67 Fed. Reg. 48,871 (2002))
